

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
THE NIGHTINGALE TRUST – ALLOTMENTS

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ST. MARY'S CHURCH

On Sunday 6th we are having our Harvest Festival in St Mary's and the school will have their Harvest Festival the week before.

The Harvest Festival in the UK has deep roots in ancient traditions and has been celebrated for centuries to give thanks for the successful gathering of crops. Its history can be traced back to pagan times. What we have come to know as Harvest Festival today is really a Victorian idea credited to Reverend Robert Hawker from Cornwall, who, in 1843, organized the first formal Harvest Thanksgiving service at his church. This became popular and spread across the country, leading to the widespread celebration in churches and communities.

However, there is an earlier tradition called Lammas Sunday traditionally celebrated on August 1st. "Lammas" comes from the Old English "hlaf-mæsse", meaning "loaf mass". It marked the beginning of the wheat harvest, and people would bring a loaf of bread made from the first harvested wheat to church as an offering. It has both Christian and pre-Christian roots. In early Christian traditions, it was a time to give thanks for the first fruits of the harvest. Pagan traditions also recognized it as a key part of the agricultural year, celebrated as Lughnasadh, a festival in honour of the Celtic god Lugh.

In the Bible, we find there are in fact 3 Harvest Festivals at different times of the year. The first is Feast of Unleavened Bread – celebrating the barley harvest in the early spring (March-April), one of the first crops of the year. This is closely tied to the Passover commemorating Israel's escape from slavery in Egypt. It was a time of reflecting on God's deliverance and thanking Him for the harvest.

Next is the Feast of Weeks also called Shavuot or Pentecost. This festival marks the end of the **wheat harvest** and celebrates the completion of the grain harvest season. The name Pentecost just means it was 50 days after the barley harvest.

Lastly there was the Feast of Ingathering or Feast of the Tabernacles or Sukkoth. Celebrated in September-October this festival celebrates the **final harvest** of the agricultural year, including fruits, olives, and wine. It was a time to gather all remaining produce. It was called Feast of Tabernacles because people would build shelters in the fields to stay in during the harvest and to remind themselves of the 40 years they spent in the wilderness after the Exodus and before entering the Promised Land. It was a time to remember God's provision during those 40 years in the wilderness.

Today, Harvest Festival in the UK is celebrated in late September or early October. While it's no longer directly tied to agriculture for most people, schools, churches, and communities still come together to give thanks for the food they have. They collect donations of food to give to the less fortunate, symbolizing the sharing of the harvest.

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A Parish Council meeting was held on 2nd September.

Present was chair J.Hume, four councillors, the clerk and two members of the public.

Apologies were received from one councillor, district councillor and one member of the public.

The chair declared an interest in a planning application as he was a close neighbour. **Reports** were received from County and District councillors.

Planning - progress: Cherrywood, The Tye. Following refusal by Babergh for erection of garage and barn the applicant submitted an appeal. This has been dismissed.

Babergh has granted permission for solar panels on barn at Curtis Farm.

Trickers Farm – Erection of single storey extension including siting of air source heat pump. Councillors fully resolved to support this application.

River House – Conversion and thermal upgrade on redundant outbuilding to form annexed accommodation. The chairman left the meeting. The council fully supported this application. The council requests that trade vehicles working on this project are parked on site and not on the public highway.

Clerk's report: Verge cutting took place in July but some roads were missed again. The County Councillor to try and sort out the problem. Many road signs are faded or damaged. Clerk will report to Highways. The defibrillator training session was well attended and informative. The council has a new website and email address. **Correspondence:** All has been circulated to councillors.

Finance: All financial items were discussed and approved. Internal audit will take place in October.

Footpaths: All paths are in reasonable condition. In certain areas hedges and trees need cutting back. A new mower has been purchased.

KCPC: A quiz night is to be held on the 22nd November.

National Planning Policy Framework Consultation: Response was agreed. Clerk's job appraisal will take place in October.

Website: The clerk has checked the website to ensure it meets with accessibility guidelines.

Pride in our Parish article for newsletter is to encourage residents to help maintain green public areas.

AOB: Concerns were raised about residents lighting bonfires. Concerns were discussed about poor mobile phone signals in some areas. Kersey Projects were thanked for organising the summer party.

Arable

Since harvest things on the arable side have been fairly uneventful. In my mind there are two landmark events that usher in the autumn. Both events, spreading the farmyard manure and dressing the home saved seed ready for drilling, passed without any drama. Since then all of the arable land has been cultivated, in some cases twice, in preparation for autumn drilling. At present the land is very dry and rain fall would help greatly with these operations. Rain would certainly be welcome on our recently established oil seed rape crop that has grown away well, with an unusually low appearance of the very injurious Cabbage Stem Flea Beetle. I am currently fishing in Scotland and although I have been relatively successful, rain here too would improve my chances of catching more salmon!

Livestock

The latest challenge to the livestock industry in this part of the country is a disease which you may have heard about called Blue Tongue 3 (BTV3). This is caused by a virus spread by biting midges. It can affect all ruminants: symptoms include a high temperature, swollen tongue and lips and breathing difficulties. Blue tongue can also cause fertility issues, abortion and in severe cases death (particularly in sheep). The problem has been known in Europe for some time and we have been expecting it to make its way across the channel during the later hot part of the summer, and so it has proved. As well as the problem caused by government imposed movement restrictions we are concerned that an outbreak of BTV3 may cause serious issues with the sheep during the autumn breeding period. Cogent are also concerned that the supply of young British Blue breeding bulls from us to their stud in Chester should not be interrupted. Now for the good news... Help is at hand in the form of a specially licenced vaccine, and today, as we seem to have got ourselves to the top of the list, I was able to order 400 doses – enough to protect all of the sheep and cattle on the farm. The vaccination process will take a few weeks and is a job we could have done without, but once immunity has developed (a few weeks after vaccination) the stock should be protected from the worst effects of BTV3. Meanwhile we are trying to deter midges and flies by treating stock with pour-on insecticides and, believe it or not, feeding mineral licks containing garlic! A sharp cold snap would also reduce the active midge population but that is unlikely to happen before November. The second and very important piece of good news is that BTV3 is of no risk to human health.

PRIDE IN OUR PARISH

Do you have time to spare to help maintain our beautiful village?

Kersey has long been considered one of Suffolk's most beautiful villages, but it does take some work to keep it that way! The KVG are a group of volunteers who have been allocated a small area of the Parish roadsides where they collect litter and report any problems with the highway or fly tipping. Whilst individual residents take care of their own gardens and hedges as they see fit, there are also a number of public green areas in the village. Some are nicely cared for, like Vale Lane triangle. Thank you to those who help with this. Others areas need a little work. These public green areas include the grassy area near The Splash, the grassed area with a bench on the corner of the road to Bildeston, Priory Walk path and the areas at the top and bottom, and the area at the bottom of the church steps. To keep our village looking its best, these areas, where there is often a bench to enjoy the views, could benefit from a bit of TLC on a semi-regular basis.

The maintenance of these public green areas is not the remit of the Kersey Footpath Working Group, who do a fantastic job keeping all the footpaths clear, the KVG or the wider Parish Council, but instead relies on residents volunteering their time and efforts. Thus far this has been done on an ad hoc basis, and more assistance is always appreciated. 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BABERGH DISTRICT COUNCIL

New Waste Collection Plans

A change in the number of waste bins and collections have been approved by the cabinet at Babergh. Residents in Babergh will not only see the introduction of new weekly food waste collections from 2026 but could also enjoy a 'recycling revolution' under new plans.

Plans will enable residents to recycle more items in their household recycling bin from 2026 to meet new government legislation where glass and cartons such as Tetra Pak will be included. A separate bin, box or bag would be provided for paper and cardboard.

The proposed changes, which as I say will not come into effect until 2026, will mean that main collections change to a three-weekly cycle. The recycle bins will be collected in weeks 1 & 2 while the Black, general waste, bin will be collected in week 3. At the same time the food waste bin/box will be collected every week. If you have a brown, garden waste bin, that will continue to be collected fortnightly.

The idea is that the General waste will decline and will not include any food that could attract wildlife.

This change will increase the number of bins each home has but the councils' waste team would be sympathetic to those with exceptional needs on a case-by-case basis.

Kingfisher Leisure centre repairs

The pool in Sudbury was initially closed in August to allow for work to be carried out after damage to a glass panel above the pool. It was hoped that the work would be quickly, and the pool would quickly re-open. Unfortunately, it soon became apparent that the complexity of the repair and time would mean a longer closure. Now further investigations have revealed additional work to the roof is needed – meaning the pool will be closed for much longer.

All other facilities at Kingfisher, including the gym and sauna, remain open as usual. While the pool is closed, the council will also take the opportunity to carry out additional surveys and maintenance work.
