St Mary's Church

Dear Friends

Many years ago. I went on retreat to a Benedictine monastery in Elgin, Scotland. I went because I had heard that they lived in very strict obedience to the Rule of Saint Benedict. I also went because I had been told that parts of the monastery were the original 13th century building that the monks had restored themselves.

It was a fantastic place to visit, we ate our meals in the original gothic refectory with stone vaulted roof. My room in the guest house was in the old cloister with wall about 5 foot thick. Services were held in the original abbey church. The monks had restored the walls and put a roof on. They had a workshop for the stained glass and when I was there, they had replaced many of the windows.

Whilst at the monastery I helped one of the brothers with the restoration work, sharing with him my own knowledge of similar restoration projects I had worked on. This brother had not only taught himself elementary stone masonry but also in his spare time to play the violin. He taught himself to play the violin from a book he had found in the library and without being rude, it sounded like it.

I asked the brother if they ever had any kind of "holiday". He said that once a year in late September they all went to the beach for a day out. And as you might imagine in the north of Scotland, he explained, the weather was hit and miss and most years they sat huddled on the beach eating their fish and chips. However, within the life of the monastery they did have a number of "Holy Days" from which we get the word Holiday. Whilst there we celebrated St Andrew's Day and being in Scotland they really did push the boat out. Not only were we allowed to talk at mealtimes, but at lunch and supper one of the brothers came out of the kitchen pushing a drinks trolley. Added to this the brothers were permitted to have a "games evening" in the common room. They got really animated playing scrabble and on the cards table there was a fairly lively game of Bridge going on.

To our eyes all that may not sound much like the sort of holiday we are used to, but as they put it: a change from the usual routine is as good as a rest and very refreshing.

As we approach the summer season, I want to wish you all an enjoyable, refreshing, and truly restful holiday. May this time be filled with sunshine, laughter, and opportunities to recharge—whether you're travelling, spending time with loved ones, or simply enjoying some well-earned peace and quiet at home. And if I might make a suggestion, try and spend some time to quietly reflect on all the good things in your life and say "thank you" be that to God or just to yourself. May the slower pace of summer bring renewal to your body, mind, and spirit, and may you return with new energy and joy for the months ahead because before you know it, it will be Christmas! On that note: have a wonderful summer.

Thank you to everyone who helped to make the Open Gardens such a successful event - from the openers to the cake makers, from the car park attendants to the volunteers serving refreshments. The unhelpful weather forecast did not deter 338 people who enjoyed viewing the fruits of everyone's labour, mostly in the sun! However there was a decrease of 230 people from the last time. Despite this we still managed to raise £2,675.53 of which we will be donating £2,000 to St Elizabeth Hospice, matching our donation made in 2023. The remainder will be used for future community events organised by Kersey Projects.


100th anniversary of Kersey church clock was celebrated in style!

The visitors to the bell chamber braved the climb up the dusty, spiral staircase to view the mechanism in the bell chamber. They were privy to enthusiastic and knowledgeable talks from our 'Tower Guides' about the 'two train, striking and going clock' mechanism which was installed by John Smiths of Derby in 1925. We are delighted to report Smiths of Derby is still in existence and continues to maintain clocks all over the country. Over 50 adults, plus children, made the climb and returned, a little dusty but delighted with their experience.

Our visitors also enjoyed delicious afternoon teas served at our Mad Hatter's table set with vintage crockery and a 'mad' cake centre piece. The afternoon was made even more special by the appearance of Queen of Hearts, The Card Soldier, the White Rabbit and the Mad Hatter. Lots of people came wearing a special hat and the prize for the best hat went to Talitha in Hadleigh for her 'death and decay' themed hat.

The PCC is very grateful to so many of you from the village who provided cakes, helped in the kitchen, provided vintage crockery, and talked enthusiastically in the tower. We are particularly grateful to FOSM for their support with this event and to the Wonderland 'characters' for adding general joie de vivre around the table - they provided great photo opportunities for our visitors.

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Farming Notes June 2025

Arable

As has been the case for the last few months, the current issue in arable farming in East Anglia is the lack of rainfall. During the recent thunderstorms we were disappointed to only receive around 6 mm, and with the extremely warm weather we are experiencing, this is a recipe for a very early, and probably poor, harvest. The recent unrest and potential warfare in the Middle East have resulted in questions surrounding the supply of granular nitrogen, one of our most important inputs. It appears that the supply of gas from Egypt is in jeopardy and this is used in the production of fertiliser. The potential problem is so real that currently we cannot get a price for, nor even get an order accepted for this important commodity. On another front I am pleased to say that the final three lorry loads of the wheat from last year's harvest have finally been delivered and we can get on with the task of cleaning and disinfecting the stores for the imminent crop. It is also good to note that every load from the 24 harvest was accepted for flour milling and will have all gone into making bread reasonably locally.

Livestock

People often ask me how the cattle and sheep cope in very warm weather, such as we have been experiencing recently. The answer is that although it may not be ideal, they don't suffer and their performance is not usually affected as long as they have shade and plenty of water. All of our grass fields are surrounded by hedges or have trees nearby and the cattle certainly make the most of the available shade. At other times in warm weather the cows will stand or lay at the tops of the hills in order to enjoy the breeze. The few animals which are still in the buildings are also comfortable as all of our sheds offer shade and sufficient air flow. Care has to be taken when transporting animals that they do not overheat and in extreme conditions we avoid the problem by moving them early in the morning or later in the day. Likewise we also try to avoid doing handling tasks when it is too hot. We felt sorry for the vet recently as their protocol is to wear clean washable protective clothing and wellies over their normal clothes: in 30 degree heat and working, sometimes in direct sunshine they can get a bit of a sweat on!

We were pleased to hear recently that one of the bulls which we supplied to Cogent last year has come out very well after being tested: after over 100 calvings he has been shown to have the shortest gestation period of any progeny tested British Blue bull. Short gestation means that dairy farmers using his semen to produce a beef calf out of their cows, have more days to milk the cow which results in more income. When Cogent are ready to market the semen from their bulls they have professional photos taken for their catalogue.....

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Kersey Crime Review : 6/5/25 – 31/5/25 :

1x Public Order offence, 1x Anti-Social Behaviour incident and 1x child safeguarding referral

It is anti-social behaviour awareness week 30th June - 6th July, so this month I have a message for parents of children aged 10-16 years old. It is about door kicking and I am not talking about a little kick, this is normally a huge front or back kick at full strength on the front door and the child then runs away. This is a craze that has happened in many parts of the UK for a few years now, historically it has affected residents of Hadleigh, but recently there have been some incidents of this nature in Capel St Mary, Stoke By Nayland and Nayland. A contributing factor is thought to sometimes be the influence of videos on social media. From my experience, the child that does this is normally with others, which highlights the issues of peer pressure or showing off. Incidents like these are investigated by the police like crime reports and can also be explored by the Babergh Community Safety Team due to the impact it can cause and what the behaviour could lead to if left unchecked. It does not take much for this behaviour to become an offence, such as criminal damage, harassment and others.

The distress this anti-behaviour can cause is often far larger than a lot of other crime types, this is because the persons home is being attacked, often when they are at home, which is a place where they should feel safe and not afraid or on edge. With that in mind, I would like you all to know where your children are when they are out and about, who they are with and as far as possible what they are up to. Be curious, ask questions. Consider apps like 'Life 360' which can monitor their phone's location, if there is resistance to this consider reminding them how they got their phone and who pays the contract. If you are experiencing these things and it is either a repeat issue or having an impact on you, consider reporting it to police and the Babergh Community Safety Team, for police this can be on 999 if it has just happened, or via 101 or an online report if the incident is long over. The council team can be contacted on 0300 1234000 or via the website www.babergh.gov.uk/report-it .
