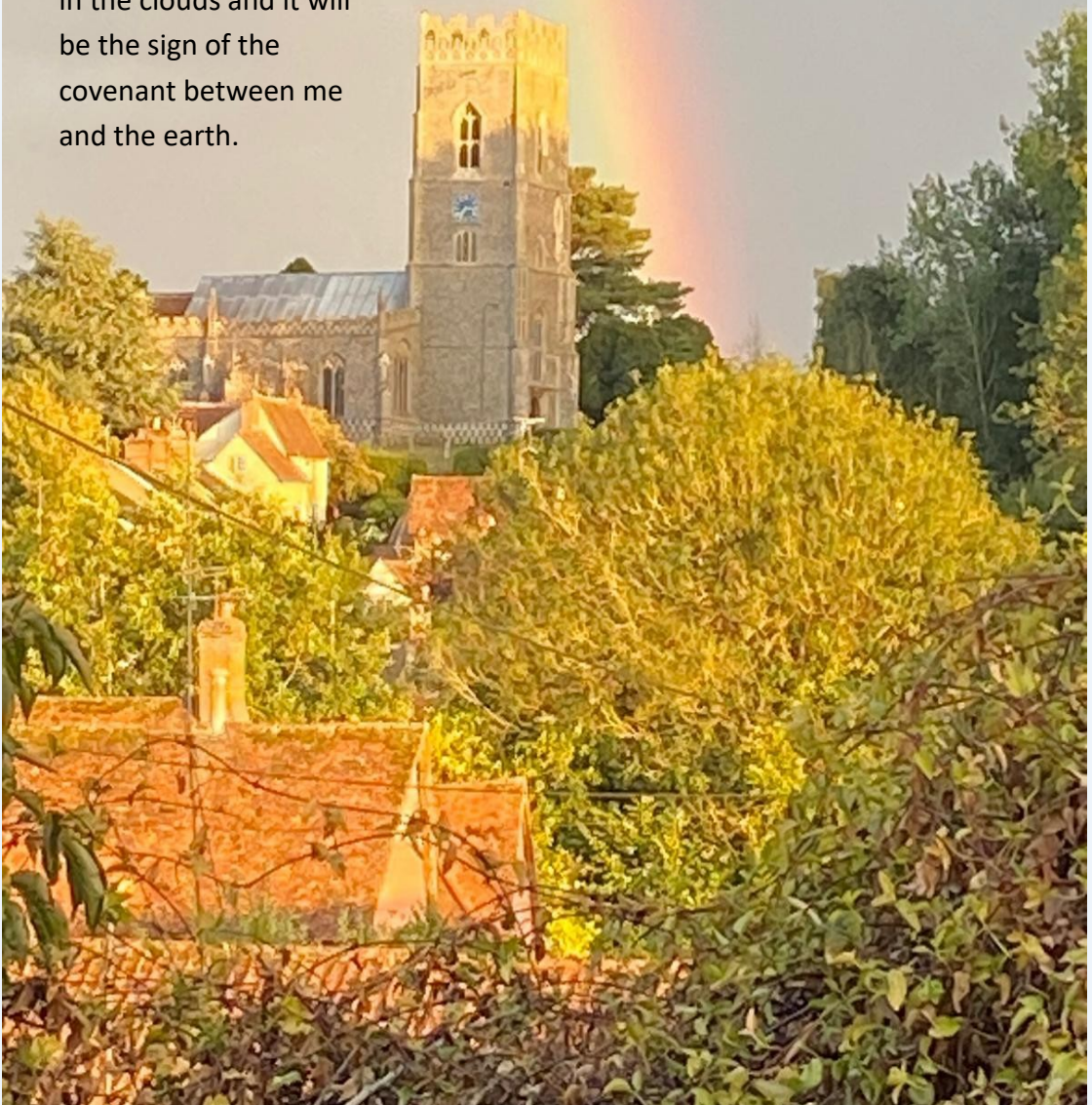

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St Mary's Church

I heard on the news that Bagpuss will be making a comeback, in a feature film. Although there were only ever 13 episodes broadcast between February and May 1974 the “saggy, old cloth cat, baggy and a bit loose at the seams” was frequently repeated on TV until 1986 and was voted UK’s favourite children’s TV programme in 1999.

For people of a certain age there is tremendous nostalgia for those TV programmes: The Clangers, Rainbow, Magic Roundabout, captain Pugwash... to name just a few. I’m sure in your head you are conjuring up even more names. Nostalgia is far more important than just getting a warm feeling as we remember things from the past. At its core, nostalgia helps construct and maintain our sense of identity. When we recall cherished memories—whether of childhood TV programmes, summer holidays, meaningful relationships, or significant achievements—we reinforce our understanding of who we are and where we come from. It can also provide an emotional anchor when the present feels overwhelming or unfamiliar. Nostalgic memories often centre on relationships and shared experiences, reminding us of our connections to others even when we feel isolated. This social component helps explain why nostalgic reflection can lift mood and increase feelings of belonging, creating a sense that we are loved and valued. Rather than trapping us in the past, healthy nostalgia actually propels us forward. It reminds us of our values, relationships, and sources of meaning, helping us make decisions aligned with what truly matters to us. In this way, looking backward becomes a powerful tool for moving forward with greater clarity, connection, and hope.

Interestingly nostalgia permeates both the Old and New Testament in the Bible. In the Old Testament, nostalgia functions primarily through collective memory and divine remembrance. The Israelites repeatedly look back to foundational moments—the Exodus from Egypt, the Ten Commandments being given to Moses at Mount Sinai, entering the Promised Land— for the people of the Old testament these are not merely seen as historical events but as defining experiences that establish their identity as God's chosen people.

St Mary's Church continued

The Jewish Passover celebration brings together this nostalgic remembrance, requiring each generation to relive and retell the story as if they themselves experienced it. In the Church we evoke this nostalgia when we have Holy Communion service when we collectively remember the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

But that is enough theology for one day (or month even). Rather let us all dip into a bit of nostalgia, be it for TV programmes like Bagpuss or the original Star Trek with William Shatner, or for music like The Who or Joseph Locke. After all it is good for us – in small doses.

Parochial Church Council continued

The PCC met on the 17th September. We had a scheduled Archdeacon visit in August to review operational management, which went well. We are updating Safeguarding training which is a prerequisite for all in authority.

We approved the Phase 2 Lighting programme which will see the rest of the church completed during early 2026. Grant support leaves the PCC to find circa £2,500 from our Restoration Account to complete the programme.

We are awaiting our EIRF electrical certificate which will highlight any remedial work required. Overall finances continue to be very challenging

Kersey Parish Council

The Parish Council met on 11th August.

Present were John Hume chair, four councillors, clerk and twelve members of the public.

Before the meeting started the chair thanked Frances Whymark for her many years of service delivering papers in the village. He also passed on condolences to the family of Norah Orriss.

Apologies were received from two councillors.

Minutes of July meeting were confirmed as correct.

Planning to consider.

3-6 the Street. Application for alterations to allow installation of sanitary facilities, new kitchen facilities and other alterations. The applicants were present and outlined their plans to bring these properties up to modern day living standards. Several residents expressed concerns they could become holiday lets and present problems with parking. Councillors fully supported these proposals and were keen to support these houses being long term lets. They would object to them becoming holiday homes.

Groton Wood cottage. Amended design. Erection of cart lodge, new boundary wall etc. The amendments have reduced the plan in size. The councillors fully supported these new proposals.

Consider progress with People and Place Plan. The steering group have met and discussed the survey responses. A public consultation event is to be held to consider action points. Some residents say they are unaware of community organisations and events. These organisations will have a table at the consultation event to promote what goes on in Kersey.

The Parish Council met on the 8th September.

Present were five councillors, SCC and BDC for part of the meeting, four members of the public and clerk.

Election. As the chair and vice chair were not present Penny Calnan was elected to chair the meeting.

Apologies were received from three councillors.

Full reports from County councillor Robert Lindsay and Babergh district councillor Leigh Jamieson can be found on the website.

Planning progress.

Groton Wood Cottage. Babergh had granted permission for works.

Cherrywood. Erection of garden room and single storey side and rear extensions. The property is at present badly laid out and these alterations will improve it. Councillors resolved to fully support.

Kersey Parish Council continued

Barn south of Water Lane. Erection of 1 self build dwelling following demolition of barn. There were concerns that the proposal was much larger than the original approved. There were also concerns about the Lane and the damage increased traffic would cause. Following a vote the councillors resolved by a majority to object to the proposal due to increase in scale that would be out of keeping with the landscape and surroundings.

Brook Cottage. Replace existing front door and fit flood defence. This would be discussed at a later meeting.

Clerks report. Verge cutting has been completed. New speed limits on the B1141 are in force following resurfacing and erection of signs. The defibrillators are checked regularly. There are now Whats app groups covering most of Kersey.

Correspondence. A resident had written about the condition of the village sign. Advice has been sought and a coat of teak oil recommended.

A new recycling scheme for smaller electrical items has been set up in Magdalen road car park in Hadleigh.

Finance. All financial statements had been circulated to councillors and have been approved.

Footpath working group. All footpaths are receiving a second cut. Some winter work will be required to hedges and tree branches. Thanks expressed to volunteers.

KCPC. More volunteers are needed for the grass cutting rota. Quiz night date 14th November.

Consider progress with People and Place Plan. A consultation event is being held on the 4th and 6th of October.

Update was given on Local Government Reform.

Consider progress on improving mobile phone reception. Not much progress has been made the clerk will chase Mobile UK for a response.

Review and update policies following a review of data protection process. The clerk has done this.

AOB. After being reported as missing or damaged some road signs have been replaced.

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Farming Notes September 2025

Arable

Cereal prices, as mentioned last month, seem to be on the decline. It would appear that our main cereal products are facing reduced demand, resulting in less firm prices. If we look at the reasons for each product it becomes clearer, although it may seem illogical, I have checked within the trade, and the following is the case:

Malting Barley

This appears to be quite a straightforward reduction in demand for beer, hence malt, due to the ongoing closure of pubs and the reduced sale of beer in supermarkets and other outlets. Possible reasons for this are the reduced amount of surplus money in families' budgets since inflation post covid, and the increased pressure on businesses since the March budget that saw an increase in employment costs. Either way, malting barley prices are not what they were!

Milling Wheat (for bread making)

With this product, the reasons for price decline are more global. Milling wheat prices are always linked to feed wheat prices with a 'premium over feed' being the norm. The less milling wheat available each harvest, the higher the premium and vice versa. This year there is plenty of high-quality milling wheat nationally, so the 'premium over feed' is lower. The amount of feed wheat used nationally for livestock is reducing as the 'national herd count' for cattle, pigs and sheep is falling. The tonnage of feed wheat used for human food (yes, we eat some feed wheat as well!) such as biscuits and cakes is also falling for previously mentioned reasons. Since the trade agreement with the United States of America earlier this year to allow the unrestricted import of ethanol, the two UK 'ethanol from wheat' industrial plants have or will close, resulting in the 2 million tons of wheat they used, having to find another market and thus flooding our internal sales.

Last year, when milling wheat from the '24 harvest was in short supply, the millers imported more Canadian (always high protein and cheap) wheat for bread. This year when we have plenty, they are still importing it as they found it advantageous to their profits. 'International sentiment for cereal sales remains depressed' is what one trader told me last week!

Livestock

So, at last some rain, at least enough to make the grass green up a little. Over the last several weeks we have been supplementing the cows diet using straw with molasses soaked into it. The plan was to soak 20kg of the liquid feed into each of the big round straw bales about a day before feeding it. This works out at about 1kg of molasses per cow per day. The plan seems to be working and the cows are maintaining their condition reasonably well. Meanwhile the calves have been helping themselves to concentrate feed from the creep feeders in the fields, which should help maintain their growth rate at over 1kg per day. If the grass growth increases due to the recent showers, I would expect the rate of consumption of straw and concentrate to drop back a little as the stock tend to self-regulate.

Our flock of Suffolk Sheep is nearing its centenary, having been established by Great Uncle Bobby Partridge in 1927. The Kersey Flock, as it is known, is in fact the third oldest flock of pedigree Suffolks in existence. Over the years we have taken some pleasure in supplying female breeding stock to new start-up flocks. That was the case again recently when a young woman from West Sussex visited and went away with 5 Pedigree Ewe lambs. We also sell Pedigree rams some of which go to other pedigree flocks but the majority are sold to commercial sheep farmers who use the Suffolk ram on crossbred ewes to produce lambs for meat.

Well I didn't know that!

Kersey has 62 listed buildings each has a story to tell. If you own one of these houses then perhaps you could bring them to life by providing a few interesting facts for future newsletters?

I have listed a few relating to St Mary's Church over this and the following page.

A church with 3 acres of glebe land was recorded here in the Domesday Book 1086, there are no obvious features of this structure remaining today

Most of what we can see today was built in the 14th century. A new 15th century tower in the perpendicular style was built between 1430-1445. 15 years to build an 80ft tower was the norm.

In 1464 Pope Pius II granted an indulgence of 3 3/4 years remission from purgatory for those who gave alms for the enlargement of Kersey church

Kersey - July and August Crime Overview

There has been no reported crime in July and August in Kersey.

This month I would like to highlight a free phone app called What3Words, which can help in certain emergency situations. What3Words is a location technology app designed to make it easier to communicate precise locations anywhere in the world. The map is also accessible on the website www.what3words.com. It works by dividing the entire globe into a grid of 3 metre by 3 metre squares, with each square assigned a unique combination of three random words - for example, ///relegate.hexes.hazy

Suffolk Police use this app (along with other systems) and from a frontline policing perspective, the What3Words app has proven to be a valuable asset in improving public safety and operational effectiveness. It allows officers and control rooms to pinpoint exact locations using a simple three-word code, which is especially useful when dealing with incidents in areas without clear addresses—such as open countryside. In emergency situations, time and clarity are critical. Victims or witnesses often struggle to describe their location under stress, particularly in unfamiliar or remote environments. What3Words enables officers to receive precise location data, reducing delays and confusion. This has been particularly beneficial in Suffolk, where rural geography can complicate response efforts. Other agencies would also find an exact location helpful, for example - reporting fly tipping to the council. Given it is a global map, it could also help if you were abroad and needed assistance to a particular location.

When dealing with my own community police reports, I will often ask for the What3Words location if the area is unclear, or I just simply want confirmation. This helps me focus on the exact location to assess and deal with the issue.

Well I didn't know that...continued

Before the Reformation in the 1540s the church looked quite different with bright vivid colours, wall paintings, stained glass and painted tabernacles

Running across the church, level with the chancel arch was a Rood Screen supporting a loft or walkway across the top with life size figures of Jesus on the cross (Rood) flanked by St Mary. One part of the rood screen can still be seen today and the spiral stairs giving access to the loft survive in the external turret.

The 18th century three decker pulpit! stood against the south wall until 1887. An iron bracket now in the middle of the wall painting supported the sounding board. The small niche in the wall contained a candle or hour glass for the preacher.



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
