



Families with age under 11


How long have you lived in Kersey?


Do you anticipate any members of your household needing a new home in Kersey in the next 5 years?





Summary of how much households value, use or attend Kersey facilities/amenities

Community life and events

Two-thirds of respondents (65%) said they highly value local community events, though actual attendance varies. While Kersey Projects enjoy regular support from 43% of respondents, only 11% attend the Forget-Me-Not social group, and over three-quarters had never been. Similarly, the Kersey Table Tennis Club seems to be off the radar for most, with just 4% attending regularly and 77% never taking part.

The Tuesday Club is another group which is poorly attended with only 10% of respondents attending often, 76% reported never going. Interestingly, 4% weren't even aware it existed.

The Village Produce Association enjoys broad awareness and popularity. Everyone knew about it, and half attend regularly. The Friends of St Mary's events are also relatively well attended, with over a third participating either sometimes or often. The Bell ringers, on the other hand, appear to be an acquired taste, 77% of respondents had never been involved.

Parish facilities and services

The Village Hall remains a central hub, with 67% valuing it highly and over 30% using it frequently. Everyone knew about it, and only 10% never make use of it.

St Mary's Church holds strong emotional and cultural value, with 42% valuing it a great deal. Nearly 60% attend services or events there at least occasionally.

While not everyone has a direct connection to Kersey Primary School, it remains a valued institution. 80% expressed moderate to strong appreciation, even though 75% never attend school events.

Outdoor and recreational spaces

Kersey's green spaces are appreciated, the playground and recreation area is moderately to highly valued by 80% of respondents. That said, usage is mixed, only a third use it occasionally, while 28% never do.

The Nightingale Trust allotments are less popular. 29% don't value them, and more than two-thirds (68%) have never used them. Still, 65% expressed at least moderate appreciation for their existence.

Local businesses

The Bell pub is both well known and much valued. 91% of respondents valued it at least moderately, and 75% visit at least occasionally. Surprisingly 8% said they weren't aware of it.

Kersey Mill and the businesses based there were valued by 85% valuing it moderately or more, and nearly three-quarters making use of its facilities.

The landscape and access to other towns

Perhaps most treasured of all are Kersey's footpaths, visual charm, rural atmosphere, and The Splash, with over 70% of respondents placing the highest possible value on each. These defining features of the parish reflect the deep connection residents feel with their environment.

When it comes to getting beyond the village, access to Hadleigh and other local services is considered very important by 71%. Access to nearby towns like Ipswich, Colchester, Sudbury, and Bury St Edmunds is seen as less critical but still significant, with 44% placing a high value on it.

This survey data clearly shows that Kersey residents hold many of their parish amenities in high regard.


What would you most like to protect, living in Kersey?

Residents overwhelmingly prioritise conservation over change, placing strong value on Kersey's historic charm, rural beauty, and peaceful lifestyle. There is clear concern that overdevelopment could erode the parish's distinct character. At the same time, many support the idea of respecting heritage while embracing gentle, thoughtful progress. Community landmarks, tranquillity, and the surrounding agricultural landscape are seen as central to Kersey's identity and long-term appeal.

Key Highlights

- A strong desire to preserve the rural atmosphere, farming landscape, and traditional layout of the parish.
- Respecting heritage while embracing gentle progress.
- Neglected and derelict houses are a concern.
- Peace, quiet, and a low level of development are crucial—residents express concerns over too much new housing.
- The pub, church, and allotments are seen as essential social and lifestyle features.
- There is value placed on visual aesthetics—including farm landscape views and heritage streetscapes.




Please tell us what is 'most important' to you about Kersey?

Residents deeply value Kersey's rural character, historic charm, and small, close-knit community. The peace, quiet, and lack of traffic are consistently appreciated, alongside the parish's unspoilt countryside, traditional layout, and heritage buildings.

The Bell pub, church, and local footpaths are seen as vital hubs of social and cultural life, helping foster community spirit and connection.

There is a strong preference for preserving the environment and resisting development that might compromise Kersey's unique atmosphere, visual character, and low crime rate. Residents express a desire for continuity, tranquillity, and respectful care of the village's built and natural heritage.



What would make living in Kersey better for you?

36 responses

Overall, the responses reflect a desire to enhance day-to-day convenience and social life. Seek improvements in roads and infrastructure, and emphasise the importance of maintaining Kersey's peaceful, rural identity by limiting development and addressing environmental nuisances. There's also a push for a more vibrant and inclusive social life.

Infrastructure and services

- High demand for a local shop and post office, emphasizing convenience and local access.
- Better public transport links, especially to Hadleigh and surrounding areas.
- Safer infrastructure: off-road footpath/cycle path to Hadleigh.
- Better road maintenance and fewer potholes are a recurring theme.
- Parking is a concern suggestions for less street parking and more off-street options.
- Improved mobile phone signal.

Community and social life

- Friendlier more welcoming pub, focused more on local needs eg pub grub vs. fine dining.
- Calls for more social events and opportunities to join local groups.
- Desire for greater age diversity and more younger families in the parish.

Preservation concerns

- Resistance to over development from new housing in back gardens.
- Mention of controlling holiday lets and speeding near the pub.
- Environmental concerns include less fly-tipping and better bird scarer practices.



How do you think we can better support the environment and biodiversity in and around Kersey?

25 responses

Residents strongly value conservation, sustainability, and maintaining rural character. There's a desire to enhance natural habitats, curb overdevelopment, and ensure the parish remains clean, green, and tranquil. All while supporting local farmers and exploring sustainable energy and transport solutions.

Environmental stewardship

- Strong focus on protecting wildlife. Suggestions include creating untended, wildlife areas, bird boxes, bee hives, wildflower planting, and wildlife-friendly gardens. Introducing street trees.
- Concerns about hedge maintenance, clearing ditches, and wider field margins to support biodiversity and prevent flooding.

Development and housing

- Limit housing development to protect green space and maintain historical character in centre of Kersey.
- Preference to renovate existing derelict properties instead of building new ones.

Cleanliness and maintenance

- Prevent damage to green spaces, such as grass around the Oak tree at Vale Lane.
- Reduce littering and dog fouling, possibly with more bins and stricter enforcement.

Sustainable living

- Promote adoption of renewable energy such as easier access to solar or other systems.
- Reduced car reliance through public transport.
- Some concern about the impact of cats on birds and pet-related responsibilities.
- Create a sustainability group within the Parish or Parish Council.



How could you be better supported to reduce your carbon footprint?

28 responses

Residents broadly support sustainability but feel planning restrictions, transport limitations, and lack of support for retrofitting historic buildings are key barriers.

The parish needs practical help, planning flexibility, and better infrastructure to move toward greener living thereby reducing the carbon footprint of residents.

Transport and mobility

- Improve public transport: frequent, reliable, and accessible bus services are needed to reduce car dependence.
- Promote walking and cycling: suggestions include creating a path along Stone Street to enable safer pedestrian and cycle access to Hadleigh.
- Reduce car reliance with community-led electric vehicle (EV) charging networks.

Renewable energy and heating

- Simplify planning rules to allow green technology installations, such as solar panels, heat pumps, battery storage, especially in listed and historic buildings.
- Encourage electrification: shift from oil/wood heating to solar and ground/air source heat pumps.
- Subsidies/grants to support residents to adopt solar panels, EVs, and energy-efficient systems.

Home energy efficiency

- Grants and tools such as heat surveys to detect where homes are losing heat.
- Insulation support, especially for older homes (eg Tudor houses) that are difficult to insulate.
- Flexibility on regulations. Allow discreet or sympathetic use of double glazing and solar tech in conservation areas.

Waste and environment


- Introduce food waste bins and promote council food scrap collection.
- Encourage nature-friendly gardens and provide local tree grants.

Community attitudes


- Several residents feel they are already doing their best or are self-sufficient with solar and sustainable practices.
- Some expressed frustration with constraints around heritage protections that limit green upgrades.
- One or two responses expressed scepticism or felt the question was unnecessary ("ridiculous question").


What are your needs to help you and your family to continue living in Kersey? 34 responses



Would you approve of some new homes being built in Kersey for people with a local connection, if it was carefully planned as to site, materials, eco-friendliness etc 45 responses




If there were to be new homes in Kersey, where do you think they should be built? 30 responses














What modes of transport do you use to get your children to school/further education? 37 responses




Speed of vehicles passing through the Parish





Summary of transport and traffic data

Key transport habits of respondents

- Travel to work over 56% of respondents drive a car, 36% marked work travel as not applicable.
- Transporting children to school 81% said this question was not applicable, among those who do, most use a car.
- Weekly transport use 87% use a car as their primary weekly mode of transport. The remaining 13% is split fairly evenly among cycling, walking, bus and car sharing.

Resident transport and traffic concerns and satisfaction

Over 40% of residents were satisfied with the speed of vehicles passing through Kersey. While only 13% expressed being very concerned.

Public bus services are a significant concern, with nearly 30% very concerned and 50% concerned. Nearly 30% of respondents would use a public bus to Hadleigh weekly and 45% occasionally. 18% would never use a public bus to Hadleigh. The most popular other place respondents would like a public bus service connection with was Sudbury, followed by Ipswich and Colchester.

Overall, views were positive regarding parking. Most respondents were satisfied or very satisfied, though 20% were very concerned.

Public footpaths were extremely well regarded, with over 93% of residents being satisfied or very satisfied.

Regarding safer active travel, nearly 49% of respondents would like more active travel options such as safe cycle routes, with Hadleigh being the most popular location to access.



The respondents have an overwhelming wish for Kersey to remain largely unchanged. They strongly value Kersey's character, beauty, and peacefulness. However, there is a desire for Kersey to grow a little with more small family homes for local people. There is a feeling that Kersey needs to evolve gently with careful, community-minded changes that support modern needs without sacrificing the parish's heritage.



Development and housing

Sensitive, small-scale development is acceptable to some, especially

- Affordable homes for local people and young families
- Homes that are sympathetically built to fit the character of the parish
- Use of derelict cottages and holiday lets for full-time families, to restore vibrancy

Community and demographics

- Desire for a balanced age demographic a vibrant mix of young and old
- More community participation and local involvement encouraged

Amenities and infrastructure

- Keep the pub open and make it more inclusive (not just fine dining)
- Add a small community shop to reduce car trips
- Improve public transport, and offer better walking/cycling connections to Hadleigh and surrounding areas

Heritage and identity

Strong emphasis on

- Retaining the parish's historic and rural identity, particularly protecting the medieval central area of Kersey.
- Avoiding merging with Hadleigh

What will be most important to you living in Kersey over the next 15 years? 40 responses

Residents wish to maintain what makes Kersey special. Its friendly community, beauty, peace, and history. They would support gentle evolution to remain liveable and inclusive for future generations. There is a desire for limited sympathetic development whilst avoiding overdevelopment to preserve the heart of parish life. Public transport needs to be improved. There is a real desire for an increase in younger families living in Kersey and more involvement in social activities to ensure the vitality of the parish.



Preserving the character of Kersey

Strong desire to retain Kersey's rural, beautiful, unspoilt charm and heritage, some emphasized:

- No large-scale housing developments
- No overdevelopment or traffic increase
- Protection of green space, countryside and wildlife
- Maintaining a peaceful, tranquil and safe environment

Community and demographics

Residents value:

- A strong, friendly community with active involvement
- A mix of ages, especially encouraging younger families
- Reducing second homes/holiday lets, which are seen as harming community cohesion
- Freedom to build modest homes for locals

Essential amenities


- Better public transport access is crucial, especially for those unable to drive, and for future generations







Other comments made by households to the survey:

Housing concerns and suggestions

- Too many empty or derelict houses: Strong desire to see these renovated and occupied before any new development is approved.
- Support for small-scale housing development, dispersed across the parish in Vale Lane/Water Lane, Uplands/Williams Green, Kersey Tye and Wickerstreet Green, not in the historic centre.
- Emphasis on modern but characterful housing in keeping with Kersey's architectural style.
- Concern over too many holiday lets and extensions leading to more holiday homes instead of family housing.
- Need for affordable housing for younger families and lower-paid workers, not just retirees.
- Opposition to large housing developments.
- Rural rental housing quality is described as poor and needing improvement.

Community and engagement

- Strong appreciation for existing community events and volunteer work.
- The Kersey newsletter is highly valued, especially farming notes.
- Acknowledgement that Kersey has an ageing population.

- Calls to encourage younger families to live in the parish and get involved in community events.
- Some residents (eg with newborns or full-time jobs) note limited time to volunteer now, but express willingness to help in future.
- Concern over low public engagement with Parish Council meetings. Planning applicants should be required to attend.

Connectivity, mobile and broadband services

Ongoing poor mobile and broadband connectivity flagged as a serious issue, especially in light
of upcoming national telecoms changes.

Infrastructure and maintenance

- Footpath maintenance and other volunteer-led services are appreciated.
- Vale Lane triangle is mentioned as in need of improvement. Cobbled corners suggested.
- Cherry Hill needs regular maintenance for safety.
- The derelict Cherry Hill Cottage is unsafe and an eyesore that should be restored for housing.
- More waste and dog poo bins requested.
- Suggestion to build a car park for school users

Other notable points

- Strong support for preserving Kersey's character, beauty and heritage.
- Need for more family homes to sustain the community long-term.
- Clear desire for small scale, balanced, sensitive change that is respectful of Kersey's unique identity, heritage, character and community feel.
